We're especially pleased to offer a broad selection of American ornaments, mostly from the 40's through 60's. A number of these are indents, which are a favorite of collectors because of their increased surface area, and greater reflection, hence more dazzle. Some are quite small, smaller than a golf ball. Some collectors shun the small ornaments, but I like them. You can always find a spot for them, unlike some of the really big ornaments. I think of them as tiny treasures, like a little surprise that you overlooked the first time. A few of these are "sugared," giving them added texture. Some of the unsilvered small ornaments are nearly gem-like in their coloring.

An interesting category that we see far too little of is one I call "Chinese lanterns." These come in a variety of shapes, and to me, they suggest those wonderful colorful paper lanterns. The color on some of these is very strong, with little or no fading. Because of their interesting shapes, they add a lot to a tree display.







"Tree" and "Mushroom"

Some of the names I use to reference different shapes are just names that I came up with. They aren't real categories, so if you try to search online for them you may not find much. Two such categories are the tree and mushroom ornaments. These are very pleasing shapes, with broad, bold stripes of various colors. I don't know why, but they are made with much thicker glass than most ornaments, much thicker than those from Europe.



World War II

If you've been reading my ornament blogs over the years you probably remember my fondness for "unsilvered" ornaments. These lack the inner silver coating that was not available during the big wars, because the mercury was needed for the war effort. Along with mercury, aluminum was also in short supply during the war, so the caps on some of these are made of paper. I like the idea of seeing though the transparent ornaments and seeing other ornaments. And I like it that they let light through, so the tree is overall brighter. They are particularly effective with white lights. These are almost always colored glass, and we see pretty much all colors. Striping or other decoration often adds to their charm. Some have tinsel inside for additional pizazz.
