This is the largest group of what I call "kitchen" ornaments we've ever had. By this term I mean teapots, urns, lamps, and various kinds of vessels that you would find in a kitchen. There are many shapes and colors that are new to us. These are all German ornaments, and

the designs were produced over many years. We feel most of these were probably made from the 1940's to the 1960's. These are extremely delicate and I'm always amazed at how they survived all these years in such good condition. They were truly loved.

Many collectors love the many different musical instrument ornaments. Probably the most common are the horn instruments. Because there are so many, the makers tried many different shapes and colors, and many have additional hand applied decorations, such as flowers. Note especially the saxophones—we don't see them very often. The horns can be hung from the branches like typical ornaments, and many can be simply slipped over a branch tip. This is necessary if the cap is missing. The biggest group of musical instruments are the bells. We must have over 100–something for everyone. We also have colorful drums and stringed instruments such as violins and violas, and one each of a harmonica and an accordion. These are mostly from Germany.

According to books I've read, the most popular vintage ornaments are birds. With such high production, there are many bird styles and colors. Some resemble specific birds found in nature, and others are made up from the creator's imagination. Most bird ornaments are fitted with a clip at the base, so it can be clamped to any branch on the tree. This is useful if the tops of your branches seem bare. Of course these clips are old, so you sometimes have to be patient with them, or find something to help secure them to the tree, such as a wire or pipe cleaner. We rarely find birds on nests, but right now we

have several that you will find very appealing. We are pleased that we have a number of the larger birds such as swans, peacocks, cockatoos, parrots, and owls. Speaking of owls, this reminds me how I've written in the past about how fun it is to collect various versions of an ornament. This can be a never ending search, but that's the fun.
